REPORT ON COIS TINE'S WORK DURING 2007 AND PLANS FOR 2008

This report covers the period from January to December 2007. Due to unforeseen circumstances at the beginning of the year scheduled planning meetings had to be cancelled. Further to this Cois Tine was without a staff member for more than two months due to an accident. Despite these setbacks and in terms of the plans stated in our last annual report, it was a very good year.

During 2007 the number of new asylum seekers dropped below four thousand for the first time in ten years. However the number of former asylum seekers either living in the community or who are 'stuck' in the system and living in accommodation centres has grown - a fact reflected in the reopening of Accommodation Centres in Cobh and in Clonakilty. Whether in the community or in accommodation centres our experience continues to show that those who are having the most difficulty in getting on with their lives are Africans. It is this group who constituted the majority of Cois Tine's clientele in 2007. Before looking at how aims stated in the last report were addressed we give a short general overall comment on the year.

OVERVIEW OF 2007

Work with the local Church and with the wider Irish community grew in 2007. The first was achieved through a number of means;

- The setting up of the Cois Tine Web Site giving us a much wider outreach ability and potential than before
- The production of themed resource materials available both in print and on the internet.
- Participation in Conferences, meetings and in various umbrella groups allowed Cois Tine to influence and provide input on strategic, church and community levels.
- Events during October the month of Mission were also a major and largely worthwhile input that involved lots of preparatory work and linking with Church, Community and Immigrant groups. The variety of these events brought Cois Tine and its message into contact with a wider audience than before.
- During 2007 Cois Tine either organised or participated in thirty eight public and multicultural events. In addition there were numerous articles in the local Media that were either about Cois Tine events or were written as a result of information provided by Cois Tine that highlighted immigrant issues or profiled African immigrants in a positive light.

Outreach visitation to asylum seekers also increased greatly during 2007 especially due to regular visitation of Cork Prison, Kinsale Road and Puc Fada (Cobh) Accommodation Centres by the Cois Tine Chaplain. The level of contact and input to Catholic immigrants also increased as a result of meetings and training sessions for the members of the Multicultural Mass congregation.

Another area where Cois Tine's has grown in the past year is in the support it provides to other organisations, groups and individuals. We have facilitated the activities of African and other minority ethnic groups thus helping the operation of these groups. We have also facilitated the personal development of a small number of mainly African individuals through advocacy, making links with relevant organisations. Without this help these individuals would not have either obtained or been able to make use of the educational/training opportunities presented to them. In addition to all the above Cois Tine's daily support for immigrants continued as before with the provision of one-to-one support, information, emotional support, counselling, training and social activities.

In the next section we will compare the aims stated in our last annual report with what actually happened in 2007.

This agreement covers collaboration and the use of office and meeting space for these groups. The overall aim of this collaboration is twofold, to facilitate the process of integration and to enable these groups to build their organizational capacity. This agreement reflects the changing needs of our client group – these and meeting them in 2008/9 will be addressed in the next section. 	This continued as planned. FUTURE PLANS

One lesson that the last year has taught us very clearly is that needs will always be greater than our ability to respond to them. While Cois Tine could validly become involved in many areas of work and remain true to its remit our limited resources mean that we have to give priority to specific areas and sometimes say no to or else postpone involvement in others. In particular in the coming year we intend to focus on certain priority areas leaving other needs to a future date or to when the resources needed to address them can be secured.

The status of our client group has also changed. Now fewer are asylum seekers - most have residency rights. As a result needs have changed. For most of clientele the problems and issues they are facing concern integration and living in the community rather than the asylum process. Cois Tine needs to adapt to this change.

^{iv} The Bridge Project is the name used in an application for funding made to the European Integration Fund. The name describes the aim of the project, i.e. to be a bridge between the Irish and the new communities that will facilitate integration and inclusion.
