In the past more than six million Irish people left Ireland for reasons including famine, poverty, search for work, escape from persecution and to find a place where they could build a future for themselves and their families. They worked hard. Many suffered while others experienced loneliness and separation. In time they settled and became part of their new society contributing to growth, life and community.



Between 1990 and 2007 over 400,000 people have come to our shores. Some were Irish people coming back home with children born in other lands but most were immigrants from other countries coming here for the very same reasons that Irish people left our shores in the past. Like the Irish in other countries these foreigners/immigrants have begun to contribute and become part of our community.
